Grade 4 From Trash to Treasure

Our Grade 4 students recently embarked on a fun and imaginative project, turning everyday items, like used shopping bags, plastic bottle caps, and bubble wrap, into creative toys and dioramas. This exciting upcycling activity helped students learn about the importance of sustainability while using their creativity and problem-solving skills to transform "trash" into treasure. The classrooms buzzed with energy and laughter as the kids explored new ways to give new life to materials that might otherwise be thrown away. It was wonderful to see their enthusiasm and teamwork shine throughout the project.







Grade 2 Police Visit

The Grade 2s had the wonderful experience of meeting the local police officers for their inquiry unit on safety. We learnt about the importance of being safe and seeking for help when we need it. The Grade 2s delved deep into identifying safe adults in our community and strategies to keep us safe online. We even got to listen to the police car siren and sit inside the back too!







Grade 6 Parliament Incursion

As part of our Term 3 Inquiry Unit, the Grade 6 students took part in an exciting incursion that gave them a fun, hands-on way to learn how the Australian government works.

During the incursion, students participated in a mock federal election, leaned how preferential voting works and what it means to have a fair result. They dressed up and role-played members of Parliament to see how laws are made. Students also formed their own political parties, shared their opinions, and took part in debates.

This fun and interactive incursion gave students a memorable and meaningful look into how voting, laws, and decision-making play a role in Australia's democracy.











NAIDOC Week



In week 1 of this term, SAEPS celebrated NAIDOC Week. It is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth. This year's theme was *The Next Generation: Strength, Vision and Legacy.*

Across the school, a range of books by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander authors and illustrators were read and music was listened to. Students learnt about some important symbols often used in artwork as a way to pass down stories and messages through generations. Students drew some of these on a leaf to create a whole school display. In the upper years, students were also encouraged to write messages of peace and healing on their leaves.



Additionally, students in years 3-6 learnt about Torres Strait weaving fish and had a go at making their own out of paper. This was a little trickier than originally thought, but students showed their growth mindsets and persisted!

Getting started with social media

Social media platforms (like Facebook, Tik Tok and Instagram) are great for connecting with family and friends through messages, images and even videos.

But there are also risks, like seeing harmful content, being treated badly, or being sent inappropriate messages.

Three questions to ask

Most platforms need you to be at least 13 years old to join. But a child also needs to be able to manage the risks. Three questions to ask your child are:

- What would you do if you saw something harmful online?
- How can you tell if an online message or person is safe?
- Who would you go to if something bad happened to you online?

Help your child

The eSafety Guide on the eSafety website can help you make your child's account safe. It is also a good idea to supervise your child when they use social media because children are more likely to ask for help when adults are interested and nearby.

Using social media safely

Talk to your child about how they want to use their account. Encourage them to:

- be kind to themselves and respectful of others
- avoid sharing details that could make it easy for someone to find them (like their school uniform or home address)

- use app features to set limits on how much time they spend on social media
- learn more about being safe online using eSafety's information for young people.

Dealing with issues on social media

It is never okay for someone to be pressured, bullied or harassed online. Use The eSafety Guide to find out how to report any problems to the social media platform. If the platform doesn't help, <u>contact eSafety</u> to help find the right support.
